LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

We started the Free Network Foundation in the spring of 2011 with a simple, singular conviction: that the construction and operation of communications infrastructure is the right and responsibility of us all. In the nearly two years since we set out, we have made consistent progress towards the realization of this idea. To all of us, it has become increasingly clear: our conviction was well founded — this is an idea whose time has come.

At the core of our philosophy is the idea that we should strive, whenever possible, to think long-term. We seek to build an organization with staying power — one that is capable of effecting radical change in the political economy of one of our society's most powerful tools.

We have built a strong foundation. We have engineered a robust infrastructure for outreach, coordination, and development, while forging relationships with the engineers and activists that are building the next generation of networking tools. Our work has been covered online and in print, by media outlets both large and small – allowing us to expand our audience and raise consciousness of our cause. We have grown as a team, and learned a great deal about what it takes to organize.

In the year to come, we will lean heavily on this foundation. The systems that we've put in place will allow us to facilitate a globally distributed development effort without precedent. We are going to deliver the tools we set out to build. The connections that we've made will allow us to establish a worldwide coalition of like minds. We are going to achieve critical mass, and a popular movement towards digital self-determination will begin in earnest.

It is with urgency and patience in equal measure that we proceed. Now more than ever, persistence is the key to a finer, freer future for us all. We will be holding our second annual Winter Summit on the 25th-27th of January in Austin, Texas. We invite anyone reading this to participate in person, or via telepresence. We invite you to join us in this struggle, because our fates are bound inextricably together, and none of us can succeed alone.

ABOUT THE FNF



GOING WEST

Last spring, the FNF moved its headquarters from New York, New York to Kansas City, Missouri. We strengthed our relationship with Joe's Data Center, where we host our primary computing environment.

NEW SPECTRUM LICENSE

We applied for and received a license from the FCC to operate radios at 3.65 GHz. This will allow us to experiment with wireless point-to-point links on a less-crowded portion of spectrum.

FREE THE NETWORK

On March 28th, motherboard.tv released a 30-minute documentary entitled 'Free the Network' focused on our work with Occupy and our mission in general. To date, the film has been watched more than 50,000 times.

BUILDING THE FNF

BOARD OF DIRECTORS

The Board of Directors met for the first time last May, and again in December. The Board said goodbye to Venessa Meimis, who stepped down this autumn, and welcomes Martin Dluhos, who is coming on in 2013.

"With more heads involved in steering FNF's direction, our goal is to ensure that it will continue pushing forward with the same momentum, closely collaborating with projects with similar goals," said Martin.

SUMMIT

From August 17-20, the FNF held its biannual summit in KC. A weekend plus of in-person contact allowed us to strategize for the next year, as well as hack on technical projects and rebuild our server cabinet.




Martin Dluhos of the Free Software Foundation joins the FNF's Board of Directors

BUILDING YOOLS



FreedomCenter, in Oak Tower

FREEDOMCENTER

Over the past 18 months, much of our energy has been focused on the design and implementation of FreedomCenter, a robust IT infrastructure capable of supporting a wide-ranging set of workloads.

In conjunction with hosting а number of web applications, both public-facing and internal to the FNF, FreedomCenter is designed to organize, facilitate, and host the development of the various network appliances that make up the 'FreedomStack'. Our core team has volunteered hundreds of hours this year to build an infrastructure on which we can rely for many years to come. We are proud to be practicing what we preach in the way of digital self-determination.

Though design and construction took place mostly in the background, comprehensive documentation of our work has been compiled and made publicly available our on wiki. FreedomCenter is a foundation, a twenty-first playground, а century forge.

PROOF OF CONCEPT

In June, Bryan visited Isaac and Tyrone in Kansas City for a sprint to demonstrate the link-layer integration of FNF's proposed regional-scale community network architecture.

We deployed the first FreedomLink radio element, and built a multikilometer "Distribution" link to a temporary FreedomTower site, where radios running the qmp ("Quick Mesh Project") community mesh firmware demonstrated a minimal single-hop "Access" network.

OCCUPY

In early 2012, we collaborated with activists at Occupy Wall St and around NYC to prototype free network technologies and raise awareness on the importance of free networks.


On May Day, Bryan, Elise, and Pablo prototyped and deployed a mobile FreedomTower. They provided a moving wifi hotspot to activists marching that day in Manhattan, and distributed flyers about network freedom.

CONNECTING FOR GOOD

Through the latter half of this year, the FNF worked with KC nonprofit Connecting for Good to set up a wireless network at Rosedale Ridge, a low-income housing complex in Kansas City, KS.

Isaac, who also serves on the board of Connecting for Good, helped C4G negotiate for wireless backhaul with Joe's Data Center and set up a point-to-point link between Oak Tower and the network.

Connecting for Good, which works to bridge the digital divide in KC, will also be offering technology education classes and affordable computers at Rosedale Ridge. Connecting For Good has also agreed to act as our fiscal sponsor while our tax-exempt status is pending.

2012 IN REVIEW BUILDING ALLIANCES

HACKFEST

In February. we participated with the FreedomBox Foundation in a hackfest at Columbia University, where Progress was made on tools that will help to build free networks.

MAKING CONNECTIONS

Isaac represented the FNF at several conferences on technology and social change this year. He participated in discussion panels at Freedom to Connect in Silver Spring, MD, and Personal Democracy Forum in NYC.

Isaac also represented the FNF at two global events — the Human Rights and Technology Conference (RightsCon) and the Open Internet Tools Project's Circumvention Tech Summit, both in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. Along with Pablo and Tyrone, Isaac also attended the Allied Media Conference in Detroit.

ENGAGING THE COMMUNITY

This year, the FNF organized several community meetings with interested individuals in NYC.

Since moving to Kansas City, we have held two community meetings for interested individuals, where we discussed what a free network will look like and how to help free networks get started and take root here.

Community meetings have helped particularly in developing the Free Network Compact, a practical codification of what it means for a network to be 'free'.

THE YEAR AHEAD

As we enter 2013, we find ourselves very well situated to make waves in the world of networks. Our team in Kansas City has settled into a new office and warehouse space, and all components of the runtime testing lab are in place in Austin.

WINTER SUMMIT

Preparations are in place for our 2013 Winter Summit, which will take place in Austin at the end of this month. Coming out of the summit, we intend to launch a capital campaign that will allow us to dive into product development, improve our infrastructure, and devote more time to the cause.

RELEASE OF FREEDOMCENTER

We are rapidly closing out our feature and bug backlog in preparation for opening FreedomCenter to the public at the end of Q1. FreedomCenter isn't necessarily intended to be a released/supported product, but if user interest is there, we may enter the "enterprise data ownership" space. This is a fully documented and replicable application/service suite, which we will use to enable various development efforts. Where most groups would have relied upon the Infrastructure-as-a-Service 'cloud', we are confident that the decision to build and maintain our own development systems will pay long-term dividends in terms of stability, flexibility, and security.

DEVELOPMENT WORK

Our lab (powered by FreedomCenter) will be used by numerous open source projects in the coming year to build a "Ubuntu LTS WISP-in-a-box (FreedomTower/Link)". This process will be performed almost entirely by the respective upstream projects who, until now, haven't had any permanent test/interop environment. FNF staff efforts will be focused around FreedomBox and FreeeomNode and ensuring 100% end to end carrier grade crypto is available to all in a turnkey package.

COALITION BUILDING

We have some exciting partnerships in the works, but will have to wait until they are formalized to announce them widely. Expect big news on network deployments stateside, and federation of free networking efforts worldwide.

We believe that 2013 is the year we make history -- with your help, it surely will be.



SUMMARY


Because this is our first Annual Report, the following figures reflect the Free Network Foundation's finances to date (June 2011-December 2012). Between June 2011 and December 31st, 2012, the FNF took in a total of \$24,394.72, and spent a total of \$18,987.71.

A large share of the FNF's income came from a \$10,000 award at the Contact Conference, a summit on using technology for social change, in October 2011, and from a \$5,000 grant in October 2102 from the Jerry Greenfield and Elizabeth Skarie Foundation. The remainder was made individual donations, of many from monthly up contributors.


EXPENSES

Of the \$16,488 we spent between June 2011 and November 2012, the largest portion went into colocation, hosting, and backhaul costs. We are colocated in facilities in Dallas, TX and Kansas City, MO, that currently cost us a total of \$424/mo. Until summer 2012, we also kept an account with Clear for 4G backhaul.

About a quarter of our costs were travel-related, either to and from conferences, or to get core team members to key FNF meetings. A large portion of our expenses also went into electronic equipment, mostly components to build FreedomCenter prototype or FreedomTowers. About 5% of our costs so far went to printing t-shirts and hoodies for fundraising. It should be noted that \$5,000 worth of our expenses incurred in 2011 came from a loan that was paid back 2012, and are listed for 2011 itemized in in expenses, but for 2012 in overall expenses.



June 2011-December 2012





DONATIONS

This data on donations includes donors who gave to the FNF through Paypal, Indiegogo, or WePay. It does not include either the \$10,000 or \$5,000 awards we have received, or donations we have received in cash, all of which are included in the above data on income. Our statistics on donations consider monthly contributions as a collection of one-time contributions.

Since June 2011, the FNF has received 185 donations. The median donation was \$25.00, and the mean donation was \$41.89. The greatest number of donations so far, both monetarily and by frequency, happened during our Indiegogo fundraising campaign from October 2011 until the end of that year. The relatively even slope in the graph "Donations to the FNF" on the following page shows our growing reliance on monthly contributors.
